John 14:5-11

***Thoughts to consider:***

Jesus made the stupendous claim to be “the way, the truth, and the life.” He either must be recognized as divine or as a liar. No other options are open. Jesus and the Father are so perfectly united that to see the actions of the Son we actually see the actions of the Father. Early Christians were sometimes known as “the Way.” In order to have saving faith, a person must believe that Jesus is equivalent to the Father. He is Divine. Jesus is not one way among many; He is the only way. People search in order to find salvation, when it is so simple—merely trust Christ as the Way, the Truth, and the Life. Exchange your way for His way. Exchange what you perceive to be the truth for His truth and exchange your life for His eternal life.

John 14:12-14

***Thoughts to consider:***

Jesus said that a person who has faith in Him can do greater things than He did. How can that be true when He is divine? These works depended on Jesus’ going to the Father. They are works done in the strength of the Holy Spirit whom He promised to send from the Father. We are not only to pray “in Jesus’ name,” but our prayers should be in accordance with the One who bears that name. Evangelizing the world and saving a lost soul is greater than healing a physical disease. Jesus left the greatest of all works for us to do.

***Thoughts to consider:***

In this farewell discourse of Jesus, He assures His apostles that when He leaves them He will send another Comforter, separate from the Father and the Son. We cannot fully understand the Godhead—three personalities in one. The Holy Spirit wears many names: the Spirit of truth; Counselor; Helper; Advocate. We receive that Comforter/Holy Spirit when we are obedient to the Gospel and what a blessing it is to have Him within us!
